## WORKING DEFINITIONS FOR THE CONFERENCE ON THEATER FOR CONFLICT RESOLUTION

The designation "**theater for conflict resolution**" is well known in East Africa as a form of Theater for Development, a broad set of studies and practices in which theatrical and para-theatrical techniques are used for social communication and social action.

For the purpose of this conference, "theater" is defined as participatory performance practices. The objective is to attempt to reach a consensus on the meaning of "participatory performance practices" that can form the basis for an international, cross-cultural, comparative project.

"Conflict" refers to tensions among groups and individuals arising from dislocations, animosities, and exclusions. Such tensions often spark violence. The primary aim of theater for conflict resolution is to increase mutual understanding and defuse tension before violence erupts or to promote reconciliation in its aftermath, rather than to respond to violence directly.

"Resolution" in these situations means work within local communities to identify the sources of tension and to develop methods for reducing and dissolving them. Examples of participatory performance practices for the resolution of conflict include work with military units in Northern Uganda, with armed rebel forces in Kurdistan, and with militia units in Northern Ireland during The Troubles. But they also embrace work with women and girls, marginalized urban youth, and rural communities as they seek to understand barriers to inclusion and how they might be overcome.

This conference contributes a humanistic perspective to Carnegie Corporation's initiative on **Peacebuilding in Africa.** The experience of theater scholars and practitioners from Uganda, Tanzania, Poland, and the USA allows comparison across continents and cultures.
